A GROUP of Ashford Road residents are fuming over a series of summer bonfires in the area, complaining that their washing has frequently been ruined by the smoke.

'It is inconsiderate to light bonfires during the day when people have their windows open and their washing on the line,' said one angry resident.

'One neighbour walked into her sitting room to find black ash all over her sofa. And with rising energy costs, it is

unacceptable to have to do the same load of washing twice!'

Kent Police say most local authorities no longer have by-laws regarding bonfires but that if people persistently lights fires that cause a nuisance to neighbours it becomes an Environmental Health issue.

Environmental health officers recommend that people talk to neighbours and take the wind direction into account before lighting fires in their gardens.
